Dear Applicant,

Welcome to the SUNY College of Optometry!

It is a great pleasure to welcome you to our campus, whether in person or virtually, for the final stage of the admissions process - the interview. By being here you have demonstrated that you have the academic qualifications that are essential for success in SUNY Optometry's rigorous academic and clinical training. You might appreciate knowing that only 30% of our applicant pool is invited for an admissions interview and you are among this highly selective group.

The purpose of the interview is threefold:

- 1- An opportunity for the Admissions Committee to get to know you better, including your explorations of the field of optometry, non-academic achievements and assess your leadership and communication skills;
- 2- An opportunity for you to get to know us better (yes, ask questions!);
- 3- An opportunity to learn more about and experience how SUNY Optometry might be the best fit for you.

Below are some insights on the format of the interview that you may find helpful:

- The interview will be conducted by two (virtually) or three (in-person) members of the Admissions Committee, which is comprised of faculty and staff members;
- The interview is conducted "open file", which means the interviewers will have the opportunity to review your entire application before interviewing you. They might ask clarifying questions about your academic records and other information mentioned in your file;
- The interview is conversational in nature and conducted in a relaxed atmosphere. There will be no tricky questions or "grilling;"
- After interviewing all candidates on that day, the committee members will make a recommendation to the director of admissions. They can recommend to: accept, provisionally accept (in the event there are any pending pre-requisites), place application on hold, or deny admission. You can expect to receive the Admissions Committee's decision within 1-2 weeks from your interview date, which will be communicated in writing via email;

Now that you know what is ahead of you, take a deep breath. Relax. We understand that you might be excited yet nervous about the interview. Remember that you have done your homework – you worked hard to secure promising grades during college, you explored the profession and got involved in different activities making you a well-rounded applicant. Now is your time to share those experiences with the Admissions Committee.

1. Virtual Interview Day Overview

What to Expect

9:45 AM EST - Check in (Zoom)

9:50 AM EST - Welcome Presentation

Your virtual interview day starts with a welcome presentation led by an admissions staff member. The presentation will provide important information about the [College](#), the day's agenda and schedule, an opportunity to ask questions, and equally important, help calm your nerves!

Candidates will then be assigned to groups of two based on interview timing, and each group will cycle through the following concurrent sessions in different orders. The small groups are intended to provide individualized support and information throughout the day.

10:30 AM – 12:00 PM EST - Interview (2 concurrent sessions, 30-minute intervals)

SUNY Optometry conducts a panel style interview. Accordingly, candidates will interview with two faculty members all of whom have read your entire application (open file review process) prior to the interview. The interview will be conversational based. The goal of the interview is for the faculty to learn more about your interest in optometry, background and experiences, and potential as a SUNY Optometry student.

10:30 AM – 12:00 PM EST – Life in New York City Chat

Learn about all that makes New York City an exceptional and premier location to call home, especially while receiving your optometric training here. A current student will serve as your inside scoop to finding your home within the city, discovering your niche(s), the pros and cons of city life, budgeting for a NYC lifestyle, study-life balance, the transportation system, etc.

10:30 AM – 12:00 PM EST - Chat with Current Students

Candidates will have the opportunity to have a casual conversation with some of our current students to learn specifically about the SUNY Optometry experience, student life, opportunities on campus, the clinical experience, etc. The conversation is not a part of the interview and is meant to answer any questions you may have and highlight how SUNY may be the perfect match for you.

2. In-Person Interview Day Overview

What to Expect



9:30 AM - Check in (Campus lobby)

Upon arriving on campus ([address and directions](#)), please check in with campus security who will issue you and your guest(s), a one-day campus ID card. Soon after arriving, a member of the admissions staff will come to the lobby and greet you to officially begin your interview day.

9:45 AM - Welcome Presentation

10:30 AM – 12:00 PM - Interview (2 concurrent sessions, 30-minute intervals)

The goal of the interview is for the faculty to learn more about your interest in optometry, background and experiences, and potential as a SUNY Optometry student.

10:30 AM – 12:00 PM - Life in New York City Chat

1:20 – 1:45 PM - Financial Aid Overview & Conclusion

3. Interview Day Tips

How to Prepare



Before Interview Day:

- We encourage you to visit our [SUNY Optometry's Viewbook](#), which has a plethora of information about our student life, graduate degree options, and a detailed look into our University Eye Center. The more you know about our College, the better prepared you'll be for the overall Interview Day.
- Consider a mock interview with your College's Career or Advising center(s). While being nervous during your interview is expected and understandable, you'll want to ensure you're prepared to communicate your thoughts clearly and effectively. The more practice you have at interviewing, the better prepared you'll be.
- Know the ins and outs of your application. With our open file format, anything on your application may pique the interest of your interviewers. You'll want to be able to provide further detail and insight on all aspects of your application.
- Get a good night's rest the night before. Interview Day, while exciting, will be a long and comprehensive day. You'll want to be well rested and energized for the big day.

On Virtual Interview Day:

- Please sign into the zoom at 9:40 AM EST. Virtual Interview Day is a professional environment, so we ask that students still dress in professional interview attire.
- To the extent possible, we ask all candidates to find a quiet space, free of distractions and background noises.
- We ask all students to review [ZOOM system requirements](#) prior to interview day.
 - A laptop is the preferred and most secure system, if possible.
 - Candidates should ensure they have secure internet connection with appropriate bandwidths.
 - If new to ZOOM, consider [testing the system](#) prior to interview day.

On In-Person Interview Day:

- Arrive to the campus early! The day officially begins at 9:40am and we ask you to arrive at 9:30 AM. This will create a buffer zone should you experience any issues on the subway or hit a traffic jam if you are arriving via Taxi or Uber/Lyft.
 - You may want to download the [MTA app](#), which provides up-to-date information on subway travel times and possible delays.
- Feel free to bring luggage with you if you need to catch a flight, bus, or train following the interview as we have a safe place to store it.
- Try to come as relaxed as possible to your interview day; the conversational interview is simply for us to learn more about you and so you can learn more about the College!

Public Transit Options from the Airports to SUNY Optometry:

From JFK (1h 15 min)

- Take the AirTrain JFK Red 5 stops to Jamaica Station.
- Walk to Sutphin Blvd-Archer Av – JFK Station and take the **E (towards World Trade Center)** 3 stops to Forest Hills – 71 Av.
- Transfer to the **F (towards Coney Island – Stillwell Av)** 7 stops to 42nd St-Bryant Park Station.
- 3-minute walk to SUNY Optometry.

From LGA (55 min)

- Take the Q70-SBS (towards Roosevelt Av via 74 St Broadway) 3 stops to Roosevelt Av/74 St.

- Walk to Jackson Heights – Roosevelt Avenue Station and take the **F (towards Kings Hwy)** 6 stops to 42 St-Bryant Park Station.
- 3-minute walk to SUNY Optometry.

From Newark Liberty International Airport (55 min)

- Take the Newark Airport Express shuttle heading into Manhattan from Terminal B (towards Grand Central Station) 3 stops to Bryant Park.
- 1-minute walk to SUNY Optometry.
